## Nature Notes

Finally, on the afternoon of the 12 March, the wind moved into the west to herald the end of winter. Within days hedges greened up, and magnolias, cherry trees, and daffodils came into full bloom in response to warmer weather. The first brimstone butterflies and queen wasps appeared, and chiffchaffs began to arrive. Lawnmowers were quickly brought out as the grass suddenly grew. Those of you who are gardeners would have seen that bumble bees were active and ladybirds emerging. Some of you have been surprised to find significant numbers of harlequin ladybirds hibernating in your properties.


They are an invasive species which arrived in southern England in 2004 and have rapidly dispersed throughout the UK. They are harmless, similar in size to our native ladybirds and are orange/red in colour with lots of black spots. Their major drawback is that if squashed, they have a defensive yellow chemical secretion which stains and is very difficult to remove. Those of you with ponds should have plenty of frog spawn by now, and even newts and toads. Elaine tells me that amongst a varied selection of birds on her feeders she has had siskins recently. Swallows, martins, warblers will be here in just a few days!!


Farming News

In his book, 'A Brief History of Life in the Middle Ages', Martyn Whittock explains how solar activity affected the weather throughout history. Between the years 800-1300 the sun showed greater activity and harvests were generally bountiful. This period is now described as the mediaeval warm period and populations rose. From 1450 to 1850 a period of reduced solar activity led to a colder climate, and this became known as the 'Little Ice Age'. Harvests were poorer and the population, already devastated by the plague, struggled to grow. Historically, the activity of the sun ruled the lives of our forebears.

On the farm, I have spent many hours of each day bottle feeding lambs. 17 pet lambs needed feeding thrice daily and after a few weeks, the pleasure soon wore off the job. All the lambs were still with their mothers, so had to be fed individually or in pairs. Grass is now starting to grow due to a warmer, wetter spring. Sowing of spring crops has been delayed and I have given up on any chance of picking some worthwhile potatoes from last year's harvest.


A Total Eclipse of the Sun - occurs on 8 April across North America. If you are lucky enough to travel to the USA, you may witness one of nature's greatest spectacles! The eclipse will track across Dallas, Texas; Indianapolis, Indiana; Cleveland, Ohio; Buffalo/Niagara Falls in New York State; and Montreal, Canada.
UK Partial Eclipse - will occur over the whole of Northern Ireland and Eire; most of Wales and Scotland; North-West England and small parts of the extreme South-West. Obviously, your eyes need protection: special eclipse glasses must meet ISO 12312-2 standards.

Gardeners' World by Elizabeth Davies

Despite more weeks of rain, the spring flowers are looking very cheerful, and the daffodils have benefited from the wet weather. A scattering of fish, blood and bone now will help feed the bulbs for next year. My favourite is the old Pheasants Eye with white petals and a tiny red and yellow centre with a beautiful perfume. It is the last one to flower in May, so daffodils give a long display of spring colour from February to May. Now is the time to cut down the foliage of penstemon which has been protecting the new growth over the winter. It is also time to cut down any ornamental grasses as the new shoots will be starting to grow.


If you have sown sweet peas indoors, they will be growing quickly and need to have the growing tips cut out which will make them bushy. It is not too late to sow them, 3-4 in a pot , and then you will have a succession of flowers. Hopefully, if the ground is dry enough, I will plant my first ones in a wigwam of canes or better still hazel branches. In the vegetable garden it is time to put in onions and shallots and early potatoes, although at the Allotments the ground is still too wet after all the flooding, and I am going to start my onions in pots and then transplant when the ground is drier.
