## Notes from the November Parish Council Meeting

**Precept** – At its November meeting, the Parish Council was able to agree that, for another year, we will be able to hold the precept at its current level. Our reserves are however becoming depleted and we want to give notice that we are likely to have to increase the precept in 2020/21. Meanwhile we will carry on with our programme of tree and maintenance on the village green.

**Village Green** – we are grateful once again to Richard O'Neil for organising leaf collection and to Dave Ward's band of helpers to dispose of it all. The green has taken some knocks this year, not least because of work done by the Water authorities who left the areas where they were working in poor condition. These areas have been levelled and reseeded, and we shall be ensuring that these patches are restored. The trees around the green are being attended to this year too.
