


Scruton Sky at Night

At 7 am on 12 December the thin waning crescent Moon will be low in the SE, with Venus to the lower left. This should be a spectacle as the Earth will be illuminating the night hemisphere of the Moon.

The maximum of the Geminid meteors takes place on the 13th. Geminids may be seen from the 4th to the 17th, and the maximum this year is very favourable because there is no Moon to interfere. This 'Shooting Star Shower' is the richest of the annual showers. Meteor rates can be around 100 per hour. December's New Moon is at 4 pm on the 14th. The Winter Solstice takes place at 10 am on the 21st. The Earth's north pole is tilted as far as it can be away from the Sun and this day is the official start of Winter.



Jupiter approaches Saturn for one of their closest conjunctions on this day when the two planets are separated by only 0.1°. Look for them with binoculars, low in the SW at around 5 pm. With sufficient magnification, you may see the four major satellites of Jupiter and Saturn's rings. This is a rare occurrence and I would urge you to witness this interesting event.

When I left school, farming was simple. Produce food for people to eat, as much as possible to feed the nation. The more we farmers produced the better off we were financially. By the time of the Ethiopian famine, I thought that we could help feed the world.

Those days are past. If we still wish to produce food, it must be no dearer than world prices, whilst the fuel and inputs must be bought at highly taxed British prices. In recent years we relied on European subsidies to make up the difference, but these end next year and government money will go to nature conservation. Do I mind? I'm not sure. Last Summer I planted 8 acres of herbal leys (a mixture of clovers, herbs and grasses to attract insects & pollinators) to see if I can feed my cattle and sheep, using lower input costs whilst helping nature. This is a trial, but producing unwanted food is certainly uneconomic.

Nature Notes

This Autumn is one of the warmest on record with no frost of any note as yet. Consequently, Summer flowers are still in bloom. On the village green, snow drops and daffodils are well through and even a few celandines are flowering. Mild weather has encouraged rooks to begin nest building in the limes and a song thrush was singing in a tree at Pittfields Corner recently. Fields along the A684 to Morton Bridge are a haven for wintering flocks of curlew, golden plover, lapwing and gulls. An unusual event has been the regular meeting of feeding hares, with eighteen spotted recently.





The first major flood coincided with the migration of whooper swans from Iceland and the flooded fields at Morton Flatts attracted a family group of six. If you see swans flying over the village don't assume they are mutes as more and more whoopers are wintering here. In addition to their larger size, they have a distinctive whooping call. Currently a huge flock of starlings is feeding on the stubble fields along Common Lane and they can be frequently seen in a murmuration. When the cold weather arrives look out for waxwings.

Scruton's Oldest Man

Alan Moore was born in Sunderland. His father was Head Teacher at Bede School (the oldest school in England); his mother was daughter to Jim Coley, a founding member of CWS (the Co-Op as we know it today). Alan was the youngest of three inseparable brothers who loved to play on the beach, cycle round the Lakes or drive their Riley Speedster to Scotland. Alan bred the first tortoiseshell mouse (immortalised on a Pathé newsreel). Selling the mice countrywide at age 16, triggered Alan's life-long love of business.

At 19 Alan was conscripted to the 51st Highland Division. As part of a small force left behind to hold back the Germans at Dunkirk, he was captured and marched 800 miles in 3½ weeks to be imprisoned in Stalag 20A in Poland. After 6 years Alan was repatriated via Odessa, having escaped both the Germans & Russians and endured the atrocities of concentration camps. On arriving home, the door was shut in his face by his mother who thought he was dead and did not recognise him. The housekeeper had to persuade her to let him in!

Alan married Hilda in 1949 and they started a bakery business, having trained in Lucerne, his wedding cakes were legendary. Alan became a trouble-shooter for various companies, spending 30 years as a Director for Rank Hovis McDougall. In retirement he ran businesses with his son well into his nineties and (as the story goes) perhaps even gave the idea of oven ready chips to McCain! Alan appeared on the Antiques Roadshow with his secret hidden radio from his POW days. He co-founded the Northdale Disabled Garden Centre and was a Northallerton Town Councillor.

Scruton's oldest man enjoyed a long and most extraordinary life.
