
Scruton Sky at Night

Darker skies mean better viewing in November. From the 5th onward, the constellation Orion is visible. low at first in the ESE sky but rising higher, ending November fairly high in the SE.

Around 6am on the 13th, we should see a wafer thin crescent Moon with earthshine on its night hemisphere. It lies between Venus and Mercury in the increasing twilight, low in the ESE.

Mars is visible during most November nights. As the month progresses, it will fade in magnitude. The waxing gibbous Moon may be seen just to the south of Mars, and the pair will be high in the southern sky around 9pm on the 25th.



Around 6pm on the 19th, the broad crescent Moon passes just to the south of Saturn and Jupiter. They are in a nice grouping, low in the SSW. Pluto is also there, but you would only see it with serious technical kit! (see graphic).

Nature Notes

Recently a neighbour noticed her lawn covered in worms when she let her dogs out for their final comfort break. We remembered a village event held on the playing fields, when people dancing in the rain caused worms to emerge. You may also have seen gulls 'paddling' their feet to lure worms to the surface. Rain can attract worms up for breeding. Other vibrations stimulate the movement of moles, causing worms to emerge to escape them.



In the southern USA, worms are collected for bait by worm grunting*. A stake driven into the ground has its top rubbed with a ridged metal bar. Worms, attracted to the surface, are collected. Look on YouTube for 'Worm Grunting in the Apalachicola National Forest'.

From the Parish Council

The possibility, reported in last month's newsletter, of placing traffic mirrors at Fence Dyke Lane and Silver Street corner has been rejected by NYCC Highways Dept. due to safety concerns regarding adverse reflections.

Parish Precept - With effect from April next year, the precept for Scruton Parish will increase by £250. This will mean a cost to each Parish household of around £1 per year.

The increase is necessary because the cash holding is still uncomfortably low, even though spending has been kept to a minimum. Tree work in particular is proving expensive and we have one due for removal very soon. It is essential that the Parish Council continues to fund such projects to keep Scruton in the best possible condition.
