

During the morning of the 6th there is a beautiful close conjunction between the Moon and Mars, when the two are separated by only one degree. The sight of the two together in the sky will be spectacular to the unaided eye and in binoculars. In fact from the Mediterranean area, Mars will appear to pass behind the Moon.

The Autumnal Equinox on 22nd Sept. marks the official start of Autumn. Day and night are almost equal in length again. The 3 space craft I mentioned last month are all now well on their way to Mars, and if you want to participate in the next main launch in 2026, just search 'Send your name to Mars' and you can be 'on board'. You can also print off a Boarding Pass – just a bit of fun for the kids!

Nature Notes

Summer came to a sudden stop on Bank Holiday weekend with strong northerly winds significantly reducing the air temperature. Despite this we still have a handful of nesting house martins and a pair of swallows. The swifts left at the end of August but most unusually one pair nested late in the season and did not leave until the evening of Wednesday 26th, ahead of the storm.



On leaving the nest young swifts will not put their feet on the ground for four years, feeding and sleeping on the wing. On reaching West Africa they will spend time refuelling and then head off on a grand tour of Africa spending Christmas in Mozambique and then starting the return journey north via the Congo and then West Africa for a few weeks of refuelling before the last leg to Scruton!! This will only take two or three weeks. They have been known to fly 5,000 kilometres in 5 days!!

The winter migrants will start to arrive before the end of September, first redwings then fieldfares.

Farming News

As I sit here on a rainy late August evening the summer seems to be slipping away. August, in this area, is often the wettest month of the year, with conversely, February being the driest. This February was an exception to that rule.

Around the bank holiday at the end of August we usually get a spell of dry weather which normally stays throughout September, and this is the time to finish the cereal harvest which this year is the lowest yielding of any that I remember. You may have noticed tall green weeds standing proud of the corn. This is a weed called Fat Hen which was grown as a crop during the Iron Age and Roman period. The shadows of the past are still showing across the land.

Potatoes are now showing signs of senescence which is the stage where the canopy dies back and the nutrients from the leaves flow back to the roots and particularly the tubers (the parts we eat) helping them grow.

Stay Safe Online

In the current climate, it is especially important to stay safe online. Dr John Elmer (a top UK Cyber Security Consultant) has the following simple tips to ensure you don't fall foul of fraudsters trying to scam you out of your hard earned money:

- 1. Always check the address an email comes from, especially if it appears to be from your bank or online retailer (like Apple or Amazon).
- 2. Your bank will never ask for personal details over the phone; if you are suspicious, call them back using the number on the back of your card.
- 3. Try, as much as possible, to use different passwords for different sites, especially online banking, PayPal etc.
- 4. Passwords with three random words are harder to break and easier to remember (e.g. BananaPhoneLamp12).
- 5. Use a credit card for online purchases, they offer extra protection and are easier to recover your money from. *Never* pay for goods with direct bank transfers.

Christmas Card 2020

The number of dogs living in Scruton has increased a lot over the past few years and although most owners are responsible and clean up after their dogs, a few are leaving dog faeces on paths, in fields and on tracks. I saw a man picking up after his dog only to deposit the mess in the hedge (out of sight etc.) This is both unsightly and unhygienic. The gentleman in question did not seem to understand the difference between muck spread on the land by farmers, the waste of herbivores and the dog mess left by neglectful owners; carnivore muck. I have heard of a number of dogs in the village suffering from stomach upsets, an illness that can be caused by faeces left by neglectful owners not cleaning up correctly. If there were more dog waste bins around the village hopefully more people would use them; towards the end of Common Lane would be a very good position.

Response from the Parish Council – We will contact HDC to see if they can provide additional bins. The Dog Warden did issue 3 warnings on a recent visit, but the problem persists.
