### **Farming News**

I don't want to spoil the party, but locally August can be the wettest month. Last year was a prime example, but the good news is that 2021 is looking like the mirror image of 2020. Last year's hot dry spring resulted in poor crops, but this year after a cold wet spring, the crops are looking far better. My first crop of silage is almost complete and I am currently baling the final 15 fields.



Shown above is my field of herbal leys (grassland comprising legume, herb and grass species) grown as an experiment. Without using sprays or fertiliser, they have produced many bales of herbal hay and silage. The insects and bees in particular have benefitted from the millions of flowers. Next winter, if my cattle and sheep choose to eat the hay and silage from this crop, I will count it as a success.

### **Scruton Sky at Night**

Over the past few years, Jupiter has been low in the UK skies, as it tracked along the most southerly part of the ecliptic. The ecliptic is the rough, broad band through the skies in which the Sun, planets and Moon generally progress. Jupiter is now gaining altitude and will reach opposition on 19 August. In astronomy, opposition is when a planet or other body is in the opposite part of the sky to the Sun. At such times, planets appear brighter and larger. In Jupiter's case, it shines at mag. -2.9 and through the eyepiece of a telescope is large enough to present some impressive detail such as the various bands of cloud in the upper atmosphere.



Binoculars with magnification of around 10x will provide views of the gas giant's biggest moons, Ganymede, Europa, Callisto and Io. Full Moon will be on 22 August, and will be just S-SW of Jupiter. It should be an interesting sight.

### **Nature Notes**

Most of us are familiar with the animals that visit our gardens, but some are less visible. Hedgehogs, which are not uncommon in the village, can be identified as being present by their black, slug-like droppings. Toads and frogs are common but rarely seen. There are grass snakes in North Yorks but I have never seen one; if anyone should spot one please let me know. Bats are commonplace just now with at least eleven species in our parish. They have wonderful names such as Noctule, Brown long-eared, Common & Soprano Pipistrelle, Whiskered, Brandt's and Daubenton's.

Young bats are starting to fly and it is not uncommon for them to enter houses. Bats are a protected species and need careful handling. We are fortunate to have Dave Long (07748 961 513) in the village who is licensed to handle bats and is happy to assist if you have a problem. Recently I was almost hit on the head by a low flying swift. As it manoeuvred past me it 'clapped' its wings audibly. Apparently this is an alarm call to other swifts and is depicted in Neolithic cave paintings in South Africa.

### From the Parish Council

Ham Hall Lane - The Highways
Agency have identified the location of
the drainage pipe from Ham Hall Lane
and believe they have located the
blockage. The remedy for the blockage
is currently being explored. This should
mean that flooding should not occur
again this winter.

Station Road Footpath - Mr. Bill Raine has agreed in principal to the proposed footpath from Scruton station to the A684. SPC have so far applied unsuccessfully for three government grants and now need to consider some fund raising. If you know of anyone who may like to contribute towards the footpath with finance, materials or labour please let us know. We are still exploring other potential grants.

Dog Mess – There is a problem with some dog owners not picking up their dogs' mess on the footpath that runs from Beech Close to the cut by Tony Hoare's allotment (parallel to Common Lane). The amount of dog faeces means the grass cutters cannot do their job; if you want the grass cut, then please pick up your dog's mess!

Volunteers Required - Graham Dodds has kindly donated 500 crocus bulbs for the village green, so we will be asking for volunteers in the autumn to help plant them. Jan Hobson is asking for some wild flower patches to be sown around the village so once again later in the year we will be seeking some volunteers to help prepare, sow and maintain the wildflowers. Volunteers are also needed to help tidy the snicket/footpath opposite the village green leading to Beech Close. Please contact SPC if you can help.
