# **Farming News**

By its very nature, November is a month of remembrance. As the days grow shorter we remember the summer now past, which was good in parts and better than the cold, dark spring.

My potatoes are harvested and, as expected, yields are about one third of those that I would normally anticipate. The good weather of the past few weeks has enabled a late silage crop to be taken and it provided almost perfect conditions for sowing winter cereals. Several years have past since I have seen the fields look this green as we slide into winter. Fodder beet is the only crop left to harvest by the contractor.

During my lifetime I have known many wonderful people in Scruton but I often think of those who lived and worked in the village in bygone times. The ditches were dug with primitive tools during the Saxon period and the rigs and furrows are the remnants of medieval farming; our hedges date back to the time of enclosures and the stone walls were built to provide work for villagers during the Great Depression of the 1920s.



### **Nature Notes**

Local beekeeper, John Wilson, tells me that his bees have produced a good crop of honey this year, despite the vagaries of the spring weather. His hives are near the Swale and his bees have access to a wide range of crops, field margins, mature woodland, wild areas and gardens. Tree flowers are a good source of food for bees, starting with early flowering willow, sycamore, fruit trees and finishing with lime in late summer. In addition, bees also work rape, beans and wild flowers including the important clover and dandelion. A major source of pollen and nectar is the invasive Himalayan Balsam, which is prolific along the banks of the Swale from July to October.



Phil Braithwaite (another local beekeeper and nurseryman) takes his hives to Masham Moor for heather honey, which he has done for decades. The ideal summer weather has produced an excellent crop this year.

# **Scruton Sky at Night**

The constellation of Orion (The Hunter) is a familiar sight during winter months and is a fine spectacle in the southern sky as it climbs up around midnight.



The top left corner of the constellation is marked by Betelguese, a red supergiant star nearing the end of its life. It is 429 light-years\* away. The bottom right corner is marked by Rigel a blue supergiant 777 light-years distant. Orion is also well-known by the 3 stars which mark his belt and the 3 which make up his sword. The 'fuzzy' patch near the central star of the sword is the Orion nebula, the closest region of massive star formation to Earth. I say 'closest' but it is still over 1,300 light-years away!

There is a lunar eclipse at 7 am on 19 November. Its early stages can be seen low in the western sky before the Moon disappears below the horizon.

\* A light-year is a measure of distance (not time). It is how far light travels in one year, almost 6 million million miles!!! Incidentally, the moon is 1.3 light-seconds from earth.



# From the Parish Council

Thank you - to Graham Dodds, Gordon McQuillen and Trevor Howe for planting crocus bulbs on the Village Green and at Pittfields Corner. Thanks also to Kevin Procter for clearing leaves on the Village Green.

Trees - Scruton Parish Council own and maintain nearly 100 trees. A tree was removed from the village green recently and 3 more dead trees need to be felled. The initiative to plant a tree to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee gives us the opportunity to replace one of these and we would welcome suggestions for location and species of tree.

Village Snickets - There is a long standing question of who is responsible for maintaining the snickets. No one responded to our plea for volunteers to tidy them and if SPC are to accept responsibility for them it will incur additional expense that has not been budgeted for. An estimate of the cost should be available for the next SPC meeting when the question of the snickets will be discussed. If you have any suggestions for the upkeep of the snickets, please come to the meeting or let SPC know beforehand, so that we can come to an informed decision.

Station Road Footpath - SPC have had a productive and helpful meeting with the Highways Agency and Cllr. Annabel Wilkinson about the proposed footpath from Scruton Station to the A684. Whilst there is sympathy about the hazards of walking along this busy road, achieving our ambition will not be straightforward. To help us progress the matter further, it would be useful to know how many pedestrians & children regularly walk along that section of Station Road (or would do so if there was a safe footpath)?
