Nature Notes

The third weekend in August (21st & 22nd) saw the first significant rainfall for several weeks. Before this rain, the north-westerly airstream brought many swallows and house martins to Scruton which appears to be a refuelling station on their migration to Africa. On several mornings, flocks of approximately a hundred martins were furiously feeding over the village and particularly around a large sycamore tree which produces masses of small insects. In between bouts of feeding, the martins rested on Margaret Ward's pantiled roof before taking off in one flock heading south. The swifts, which appear to have bred well this year, left on 10 August, since when most of our village swallows and martins have also departed.





Prior to the last couple of weeks, this summer has not been good for butterflies but recently, as well as tortoiseshell, peacock and red admiral, I have had gatekeeper, wall, and comma in the garden not to mention many large whites!




Farming News

Summer always seems to slip away during August. The long summer evenings are suddenly missed by the end of the month as the Sun is setting by 8 pm and suddenly we realise that autumn is here. Autumn, by the way came from the French language, and our old English word for the season was the 'fall' because it signified 'the fall of the leaf' as opposed to 'the springing of the leaf' earlier in the year. Who knew that the Americans had the correct word all the time!

As I write, the cereal harvest is progressing well, now that we are in a settled spell of weather, although yields will be lower this year due to the cold spring and darker than average summer.

The potato crop is dying back earlier than normal this year but this might be the effect of drought, because the potato tops have died fastest on the sandiest land. As the top of each plant dies it allows the nutrients from the leaves to return back down into the tubers and this helps to swell each tuber but I have been told that this process also helps add flavour to them.

Potato Weigh-In for the annual potato growing competition will be held at the Village Picnic this year. The potatoes are grown from a single tuber in a bag over a period of 6 months. The potato (a variety chosen by Chris Snell) is grown in a common sized bag using whatever growing media/fertiliser the entrant wishes. This is the second year the competition has been open to all villagers and we are hoping for plenty of entries.

Scruton Sky at Night

Skies are gradually getting darker, and a New Moon on 7 September means there will be a better opportunity to view the sky since there will be no moonlight to interfere. On 14 September, when the planet Mercury appears at its farthest from the Sun, will be the best time to catch a glimpse of this often elusive planet. Look low in the western sky just after sunset. On 20 September there will be a Full Moon, which is often referred to as the Harvest Moon.

The Autumn Equinox occurs on 22 September which is when the Sun is directly above the Equator, and all parts of Earth experience equal day and night. For us in the Northern Hemisphere, days will gradually get shorter after the Autumn Equinox.

From the Parish Council

Ham Hall Lane - The blockage in the drain pipe from Ham Hall Lane has been identified and a contractor engaged to lay a new section of pipe around the tennis court to the new drainage outlet in the cricket club car park. It is hoped that the work will be completed during September and will alleviate the flooding problems of the last few years in Ham Hall Lane. In the meantime, those using the allotments or tennis court must circumnavigate the workings and gain access via the rear of the tennis court.

Bulb Planting – Further to the donations of bulbs for the village green (ref. last month's newsletter), there has been a suggestion that perhaps we should also look to plant bulbs on the roadside grass verge by Pittfields, the Parish Council would appreciate some feedback on this initiative.

Solar Farm - Due to the differences between the DEFRA Land Classification & Lightrock's soil analysis, Hambleton District Council Planning Department have commissioned an independent soil survey. This has delayed the Planning process, but the Parish Council will provide an update as and when we are advised that the process has resumed.

Richard O'Neil - Some of you may have heard that Louise and Richard O'Neil have left Scruton for pastures new. Richard was a long standing Parish Councillor and Scruton Parish Council are grateful for this opportunity to pay tribute to him for all his hard work. We wish them both every happiness in their new home.
