Gardeners' World

The rain at the end of July will have done much good, but it has spoilt the roses that are flowering now, so I give them a light prune, a feed of Fish, Blood and Bone and hopefully in a few weeks time they will have a second crop of flowers, although not all roses are repeat flowering. The perennial geraniums such as 'Johnson's Blue' have finished flowering and can be cut down to the ground to produce new growth, and hopefully a second flowering. Geranium 'Rozanne' and 'Ann Folkard' are still flowering, so leave them until later.

Dianthus, or Garden Pinks, such as 'Mrs Simkins' and 'Doris' die back after 3 or 4 years, but are easily propagated and now is the time to do it. Take new shoots, cut at a leaf node, strip off the bottom leaves and then insert round the side, in gritty compost, preferably in a terracotta pot. Then stand them in the greenhouse or on a windowsill, but not in full sun. This is also the time to take penstemon cuttings, treat them in the same way as the dianthus. Tomatoes are starting to ripen, so cut off the lower leaves to let more light to the fruit and after 5-6 trusses take off the top of the plant, and keep removing side shoots.



Farming News

If the weather dries up in the coming month, then that will be perfect. Almost all of the first crop of grass has been made into hay because it was drying out so fast in the sunshine that I just left it for hay. Why bother with the expense of wrapping it in plastic to make silage, when a couple of extra days in the sun would dry it enough to store as hay? The current rainy spell has encouraged the grass to grow again. Those who mow lawns will have noticed how much more grass is around, compared with last year.

At the time of writing, I still have yet to start harvest. The winter barley was almost dry enough a couple of weeks ago but once the rain arrived any chance of harvest was lost and we now have to wait until sun and wind dry the grains enough for them to store over the coming winter. I don't mind a couple of weeks of rain in the middle of summer. It encourages the grass and the root crops to grow and I can utilise the rainy days to repair and service machinery. If the weather dries up now, it will be perfect!



Nature Notes

We have at least one pair of sparrow hawks which operate in the village. Those of you with bird feeders will be aware of the sudden attacks on garden birds, or more usually the tell-tale sign of a patch of feathers on the lawn. Now young sparrowhawks are near fledging, which coincides with the abundance of new garden birds, consequently the adults are continually hunting.



I have feeders above a shrubbery and recently the male sparrowhawk has altered its killing strategy. Initially it will attack the feeding station and if it fails to kill, will sit above in the cherry tree and wait for its prey to seek shelter in the shrubs. Then it dives into the shrubs and chases them, running from bush to bush until it has success or gives up.

Tony and Judy Phillips recently saw a red kite attack a group of young rabbits playing on their lawn. They were amazed at the manoeuvrability of such a large bird and its colourful plumage. At dusk, Mary and Rory Clarke have seen a barn owl quartering the grass field in front of the pub. It usually exits the field over Fleetham Lane into the Parklands.



Finally, if you are walking, especially with dogs, be aware that ticks are plentiful this year, especially in woodland and moorland with bracken. This is a high risk area and Lyme disease, although still uncommon, can be very nasty.

Solar Array Approved

The outcome of Lightrock's appeal against HDC's refusal for a Solar Array was published on 27 June. The scheme will now go ahead, subject to conditions.

Decision - The main issue in the appeal was the effect of the development on, and potential loss of, agricultural land.

Whilst recognising that land classification is a matter of judgement by experts, the independent inspector concluded that most of the site is not 'Best & Most Versatile' land. Moreover, even if it was, the land would not be 'lost', and neither the Local Plan nor National Policy prevents the use of such land. Nor are there any suitable alternative lower grade sites. The inspector states that the specific way agricultural land is used is not subject to planning controls. The fact that the proposal limits arable farming, does not mean that it results in the loss of land, when it can still be used for other purposes, grazing of sheep, or even left fallow (which is encouraged by current government schemes), whilst also being used to produce solar energy.

The Appeal Decision also states that the proposed development would not be detrimental to the nation's food security. It further states that any adverse impact on the countryside would be limited to a localised area, which could be effectively mitigated. It notes that the site has an immediate connection to the nearby substation, and the development would be a valuable contribution to achieving renewable energy goals, as well as achieving biodiversity net gains.

Costs - Although parties normally cover their own expenses in planning appeals, full costs were awarded to Lightrock because HDC acted unreasonably and failed to produce evidence to support the scheme's refusal, thereby delaying a plan that should have been permitted.

Responses – SPC response to the decision is covered overleaf in the Parish Council's Column. Chris Sowerbutts (Lightrock) said, "We understand this is not the outcome that everyone in the village was hoping for, but we do hope to be able to move forward constructively to ensure the delivery of a high quality project with a minimum of disruption to village life. We remain in favour of a community benefit fund and positive community impact."

Solar Array - The Planning Inspector has overturned HDC's planning permission rejection of the Solar Installation. SPC are disappointed at the decision and the manner in which the appeal hearing was conducted and are exploring options to challenge the decision.

The Inspector placed a number of planning conditions that must be adhered to in constructing the facility. We will be closely monitoring the construction phase with an expert to ensure those conditions are fully complied with and that the disruption to the village is kept to a minimum.

Coronation Memorials - The new Playing Field entrance has necessitated a new notice board. This will be jointly funded by the Cricket Club, the Playing Fields and SPC and will be the village commemoration of the coronation of His Majesty, King Charles III.
