Congratulations to the Scruton Fest Team!

Scruton Fest was a roaring success last weekend, thanks to the Fest Crew (SPFA) and *everyone* who supported and participated in the event in any way.

Villagers enjoyed picnics in brilliant sunshine while Scruton Jazz Band made its debut performance. The traditional elements (Raffle, Tombola, Plants and Cake stalls) together made over £2,800! (plus matched funding of £1,000 from Barclays for the raffle). The organisers said, "Stall holders and catering vendors all reported good sales, and we have received many generous donations. The bar was popular, selling over 700 pints of beer and countless other drinks.". Gardeners' World by Elizabeth Davies

After a very dry month, at last a drop of rain, although we need more. Some plants have done well and the roses have been spectacular with more flowers than usual, although they haven't lasted long in the heat. So lots of dead heading, cutting back to a leaf bud, not just snapping off the head, hopefully we will get a second flowering. With the dry, hot weather varieties prone to black spot have suffered, especially climbers like Iceberg, as there hasn't been the air flow around them and some have lost their leaves. Nothing suitable to spray them with but if you water and feed them, they will come into leaf again.

Take out the side shoots from your tomato plants (except the bush varieties) to keep the plant under control and help put its energy into producing fruit. Feed weekly with a high potash fertiliser.

Delphiniums have almost finished flowering so cut them down to the ground, give them a good water and feed with Fish, Blood and Bone or a liquid fertiliser. Later in the year, you will get a second flowering. This also applies to oriental poppies.

A garden well worth visiting at the moment is Mount Grace Priory by the A19, redesigned by Chris Beardshaw.





Farming News by Malcolm Barker

I write this on the day after Scruton Fest. When I returned home, I checked the sheep because I had a nagging feeling that something was wrong. They sounded unsettled. As a farmer, you need a sixth sense for trouble and thundery weather sets off two alarm bells for me, namely, blight in potatoes and maggots in sheep. I soon saw the visual evidence such as a dark patch appearing upon the fleece and the sheep nibbling at the air as though they are wanting to bite at the offending parasites. Another observation is that green bottles can be seen landing upon the fleece ready to lay more eggs to the infestation.

I could hear the music playing down in the village, as the evening progressed under the mackerel sky. I sheared all of the affected sheep and sprayed an insecticide upon the affected areas to kill any remaining subcutaneous maggots which writhed as they escaped from the lymph filled burrows they had made beneath the ovine flesh. It became too dark to shear as the music from the playing fields ceased and the noctilucent clouds in the northern summer sky were replaced by the glow of another display of northern lights.

The first Glastonbury Festival was

attended by 1,500 people in 1970 at Worthy Farm, Somerset. Today its attendance counts as a large city! The first Scruton Fest was held on the village playing field on 24 June 2023 – who knows what the future may hold!? - Ed.



Nature Notes

Recently I walked up Meeth Gill just west of Reeth to the Old Gang Smelt Mills to see how many species of upland birds I could find, especially summer migrants. As this is the height of the grouse breeding season there were numerous groups of young, varying in size from just hatched to virtually full grown. Young grouse can fly at 12 days old, so it looks rather incongruous to see an adult fly off followed by a squadron of miniatures. I also spotted pleasing numbers of curlew, lapwing, golden plover, a pair of stone chats and many meadow pipits. While approaching the Old Gang I heard the 'kronk kronk' call of a raven. They are very inquisitive birds and will come and check you out.



The ruins of the smelting mill are surrounded by rock waste, an ideal habitat for wheatears, small migrant birds from Africa, which nest amongst the rocks. Nearby were two pairs of ring ousels, or mountain blackbirds. The male has a characteristic white bib on its chest, whereas the female resembles a garden blackbird. Walking back to the car and feeling pleased with my tally, I spotted a young cuckoo on a fence being fed by two meadow pipits! Eventually it



flew off with its foster parents in pursuit.
