Gardeners' World

How good to see the snowdrops, aconites, crocus and early daffodils, spring is just around the corner and the village green is looking lovely!

Snowdrops benefit from splitting when they become congested. Do this after they have flowered when the leaves are green. Split them into roughly 6 bulbs and replant, an easy way to increase your stock or give away. Garden Centres are charging £7 a pot for a few bulbs!



Hellebores are flowering and if you have not already done so, cut the old leaves down to the base as they can become diseased. They come in different shades of pink as well as white, some white are spotted and I have a black and a yellow one. There are also double ones. Let them set seed and self seed, so that next year you will have lots of young plants which will flower after a year or two, more free plants!

Now is the time to chit early potatoes, either in egg boxes or trays, with the blunt end up, somewhere light and frost free, a windowsill is ideal. When the sprouts are 2.5 cm in a couple of weeks, plant them out. If garden space is an issue, plant them in pots, sacks or plastic bags with holes. Swift or Rocket are a good variety for our soil.

Nature Notes

While admiring the spring flowers in the church yard, I noticed grey squirrels chasing each other along the church wall. This is the beginning of their breeding season and there was much squabbling. Grey squirrels were introduced in Britain in the 1870's and spread rapidly, displacing the native red squirrel by a combination of greater physical size and reproductive capacity, allied to it carrying the squirrel pox virus, for which the red has no immunity.





Schemes have been introduced to reduce grey numbers and increase red, with some successes. In the long term the answer may lie with the pine marten which is very partial to greys. Due to their destructive nature, grey squirrels are classed as vermin and it is illegal to keep them as pets or release them into the wild. If you trap them they must be dispatched. Whilst researching this article I read legal guidance regarding the trapping of greys which went into the dos and don'ts of the operation. A final suggestion on the 'disposal of carcasses' - they can be eaten! I have a recipe for squirrel casserole!

Unfortunately, amongst their many destructive attributes greys have a penchant for lead flashing and pipes and can cause significant damage to property. Currently the church and the Old Rectory are under attack!

A Load of Old Rubbish!

Farming News

Well, we're over the bleakest months of the year. I can't say that the coldest part is yet over because recent years have brought a cold east wind during March and April. March is a hopeful month, with lighter mornings and evenings and the promise of summer approaching.

Most of my sheep have lambed, with only a few 'stragglers' remaining. I like the sheep to lamb during the winter months because I have more time to look after them before getting busy in spring. For 40 years I have done around 110 hours of work each week during lambing, my busiest time of the year; this drops back to around 60 hours per week at my easiest time, during late spring.

You will be aware that the supermarkets are starting to run short of certain foods. They refuse to pay suppliers any extra to compensate for increased production costs brought about by higher energy and fertiliser prices. Many farmers are cutting back on the food crops which they are planting this coming year. I will only plant half as many potatoes, it is uneconomic to spend £12 to grow a sack of potatoes which I then deliver for £10!


