Gardeners' World

Dahlias and michaelmas daisies are in full flower and have stood up well to recent storms. My favourite is the small flowered variety 'Little Carlow', a lovely shade of mauve with masses of flowers, bought from Old Court Nurseries in Worcestershire, who hold the National Collection of michaelmas daisies with over 400 varieties. My plant has been covered in bees and Red Admiral butterflies. Keep dahlias flowering for as long as possible by dead heading them. The buds and seed heads are similar, but the cone shaped head is the old flower, and the new bud is circular.

Tiny cyclamen hederifolium are also in full flower with masses of pink or white flowers above small marbled leaves, similar to ivy. Cyclamen prefer shaded areas with their corms just below the surface. When they set seed and are ripe, they burst open and scatter their seeds and you soon have many new, free plants!

If your potato leaves have brown patches and curl up quickly, it is a sign of Potato Blight, and the potatoes will not keep through the winter unless you cut the leaves to ground level to prevent the blight spreading down to the tubers.

Nature Notes

In early September, I woke to find my car covered in Sahara dust, thanks to a huge plume of hot air from the south. Sahara dust is responsible for delivering an estimated 22 kilotons of phosphorous and other nutrients to the rain forests of South America. Local farmers will be only too happy to receive free fertiliser!



I was surprised to see 3 moorhens in the churchyard recently as they are not common by the Swale. Some of you have reported seeing mink and these voracious predators are probably responsible for the demise of local mallard, coot and moorhen. Mink were introduced from the US into fur farms in the late 1920's but were banned in 2003. There were escapees and deliberate releases into the wild and mink soon became prevalent in many UK river systems. Despite their negative impact on native wildlife, all governments have failed to set up eradication programmes. It is legal for landowners or their reps to trap and shoot them.

Look out for a Great White Egret by the Swale, it is as large as a grey heron.

Community Liaison Group

With the prospect of a solar farm development due to take place on our doorstep, a suggestion has been made that Scruton residents may form a 'Community Liaison Group' with the following aims:

- To create a channel for open dialogue to take place directly between the developer and the community.
- Minimise the impact of the development on the village and any disruption to village life, especially during the construction phase.
- Maximise any benefits for the village via a 'community benefit fund'.
